

Initial Consultation Meeting Questionaire

To begin your new home process, we will need to meet with you to listen to your hopes and dreams. We will need approximately 2 hours of your time for this meeting. These meetings usually take place at the Atkins Family Builders home that is either closest to your existing home or possibly the one we determine may be somewhat like the home you desire to build. Your meeting will be directly with the builder, Steve Atkins.

Once completed, the following pages will provide us with vital information to start your design and also, hopefully, inspire your thoughts on your future home. In short, we try to capture the essence of how you live so you will want to live in your new home for many years to come.

We will try to help determine everything about your new home, from the simplest and most obvious, such as the number of bedrooms and bathrooms, to less common features such as personal and public entertainment areas, specialized storage space, and even the home's physical location and architectural style.

Before we start, we encourage you to invest some time thinking about your current lifestyle by filling out this "fun homework".

Client Names (Legal names for the paperwork): Names you prefer to be addressed as: How long do you plan to live in this home? Do you have a timeline/schedule in mind for when to start construction? When do you desire to complete construction? Are these rigid time constraints? Have you built a home previously? ______ How many? Did you build or remodel the home you currently live in? What went well? What areas could have used improvement?

Our method for sorting out what is most important to *you* is for you to think about your new home, take time to create a wish list of what you'd like or *wish* to have and a separate list of what you *must have* to meet your family's needs. Prioritize these lists.

The "wish" list allows you to dream, while the "must haves" list keeps your feet on the ground. The process of creating the lists establishes expectations, minimizes impulsive decisions, and fosters an objective

balance between fantasy and reality. Together, your lists create the foundation for a focused search and the ultimate discovery of the home that best suits your lifestyle, going a long way toward assuring your satisfaction now and long into the future.

Consider the following guidelines to get you started:

- **Keep separate lists.** Maintain individual "wish" and "must haves" lists. Separate lists will help you recognize what you really need and help you prioritize everything else.
- **Start a clip file**. Supplement your lists with photos and articles from magazines, newspapers, and online resources to reinforce and illustrate your ideas, providing even greater detail for our designer. If you see a home down the street that catches your eye, maybe the dormer, the stone or the front entry that you really must have, snap a picture of it. Pictures of design features that you desire to incorporate in your home are great tools to communicate to our designer.
- **Think outside the kitchen.** In addition to the "glamour" rooms, keep in mind storage areas, laundry and service rooms, and family and entertainment spaces. These "additional spaces" are vitally important to the comfort of your family and critical to your ultimate satisfaction.
- **List your dislikes**. Keep track of the things that annoy you about your current home (as well as homes you've lived in, seen, or visited over the years) and promised yourself to avoid or change. Your new home is a chance for a fresh start, so take advantage of the opportunity. This third list, your "dislikes" is as important of a communication tool as the first two lists.
- **Prioritize**. Upon completing each list to your satisfaction, take an objective look at what's really needed and what you're willing to tradeoff, for whatever reason. Prioritize each list and eliminate items that you know are unrealistic or unnecessary. Then transfer items low on the lists to separate lists of wants and needs that you can list as "desires" if the budget allows or to be planned for in the future.

List things you "must have" in your new home (and remember to prioritize/hottest items first).
List things you would like or "wish" to have in your new home (again prioritize)
List things you "desire" to add to the home if the budget allows (again prioritize)
List some things you "dislike" about your current home, or changes you would make

YOUR FAMILY AND IT'S LIFESTYLE

How many people will be living in your new household? What are their names, gender and age? Do they have any particular preferences, interests or special needs?

Do you entertain often? What kind of entertaining do you do – formal entertaining or family/friends entertaining?
Do you work at home or when you are home, do you spend a lot of time working?
How avidly do you watch TV? How many TV's do you want in the new home and where? Is a home theater important?
How many fireplaces do you want in the new home and where? What style and where?
Is a snack bar or wet bar important to have in or near the recreation room, kitchen, living room?
Do you like to entertain outdoors? Are you interested in an outdoor living area, deck, patio, outdoor cooking, outdoor kitchen, outdoor fireplace/fire pit, sport court, other outdoor activities?

Here is a list of rooms. Please check the ones you desire to have in your new home and in the column marked "Floor" denote what floor level you desire them to be on (first, second or lower level). If you don't have a strong preference to what floor that the room must go on, leave it blank. This will allow the designer some flexibility. You can add rooms to the list as necessary.

Next comes room size. Measure the rooms in your current residence that you desire to have in your new home. Let us know if the sizes of those rooms are as you desire or if you want your new rooms to be larger or smaller and by how much. One person's definition of a large master bedroom may be different than someone else's. This exercise will eliminate any confusion.
